FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

As I write this article, we are in the midst of Trinity Week. The using the true, inspired, inerrant Word of God gives to us the wisdom to know that there is only one true God, and that God is triune, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Sadly, the devil has through the millennia influenced societies and individuals to believe that either Christianity is false or that it is no different from any other spiritual belief. Even within "Christianity" there are a myriad of beliefs, and for all, but true Biblical Christianity, they teach an unbiblical God. If you entered into any major city, and probably in some smaller municipalities, you would find that there are more than 200 religions represented. We live in a very diverse world and in a very diverse nation. The differences in these belief systems can very easily cause chaos and in some instances cause riots as these different religions cause everyone to see the world differently. This can easily be seen in how religions vary widely on the basic subjects of God, man, evil, history, authority, ethics and morality, and the way of salvation.

God is viewed in fundamentally incompatible ways in the world's religions, that is, God is viewed as One, Many, He, She, It, Us, Father, Mother, "all of the above," or "none of the above."

Religions often claim knowledge about ultimate issues, including many that believe in the existence of God. However, in Atheism, there is no God. In Agnosticism, nobody can know one way or the other whether there is a God and thus skepticism is the only reasonable position. Polytheists (e.g. ancient Greece and Rome, Hinduism, and many tribal religions) hold to the existence of many gods, while Pantheists see God and the world as essentially one. Christian Theism says that God created the world, is superior to it yet is separate from it.

For Islam, Allah is God and Mohammed is His Prophet. Jesus Christ was only a prophet or messenger from God. The central Christian claim

that in Jesus Christ you find God Almighty veiled in human flesh is blasphemy in Islam. God is not Trinitarian in nature in Islam.

Judaism agrees with Islam in the belief that God is one and not Triune in nature, and that Jesus is not God and did not rise from the dead to verify His claim to be God; they are still waiting for the promised Messiah to enter into the world and be the anointed One who will save them. Buddhism holds that there is no "God" out there apart from the created world, but that spiritual enlightenment comes from following the seven-fold path. In Hinduism and many eastern religions, God is coexistent with both man and nature. For Mormonism, Adam was once a god, and we too can become gods. God the Father is an exalted man (a man who has progressed to godhood) with a body of flesh and bones. In New Age thinking, you are God. For Christianity, God is Triune in nature, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as God teaches us in His Word. Our three Ecumenical Creeds proclaim this and teach us that God the Father Almighty created the world, that Jesus is fully God and fully man who was born of the Virgin Mary so that He would teach the world regarding who God really is and ultimately offer Himself as a sacrifice for the sins of the world, then on the third day (Easter) rise from the dead, conquering death for all who believe and giving to us the certainty that on the last day He will raise our lowly bodies to be like His heavenly body. Then there is the Holy Spirit, the third person of the trinity. The Greek word for spirit, pneuma, should be literally translated as breath, wind, or air. With this understanding of pneuma God teaches us that the Holy Spirit breathes faith into us so that as we read and hear God's inspired, inerrant Word we would believe and trust in the one true God.

In next month's newsletter article, I will write regarding how we Christians are able to interact with non-Christians and prayerfully proclaim the Good

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Board of Evangelism met on June 1, 2025, between services.

We welcome Jennifer Wolfe to the board as she is the chair of Hearts of Compassion which includes the Clothes Closet and the Food Pantry.

We discussed the immediate needs for upcoming items in which Evangelism can help. The first was Vacation Bible School (ran from 6/9 to 6/13/25). It was a big success. Kudos to the Education Board for a successful year! We discussed the Food Pantry supplies and where those needs are. Many thanks to the Windsor Forest Garden club for donating jars of peanut butter.

The other immediate need is that the Clothes Closet needs men's pants – pant sizes needed are the smaller size waisted pants. Donations of pant waists are 28 through 34. Various inseams range from 30 to 34.

Lizzie Comfort Dog ministry was open for discussion. We are glad that Lizzie is doing well health-wise. Top Dog Cindy Baldwin is always on the go and taking Lizzie to meet and greet people. It is great to see the pictures of how Lizzie impacts people's lives.

MCP, our newest outreach ministry, has been busy receiving the shoeboxes for Christmas. These shoeboxes are packed into a much larger box, picked up in Savannah, and taken to Jacksonville for shipping. Phil explained that this box will be shipped no later than July 4th in order to get the

shoebox gifts over to the Philippines in time for Christmas. He explained that the boat has to go through Customs once in China and then is shipped once again to the various island of the Philippines. Once the gifts have been delivered, the people who have donated items will receive pictures and a note from the children who have received a box.

Novemberfest is coming up on November 8th. Evangelism will once again have a table with free reading material. The hours for Novemberfest are 10 AM to 2 PM. Once again, Lonna McEwen and Betty Morrel are in charge. Shirley Lewis will be with the plants in the Education Building. Jackie Deemer will be with the Bake Sale which is also in the Social Hall.

A Hearts of Compassion Committee has met to discuss a grant from the GA-FL District Kingdom Seed. More details will be forthcoming. Hearts of Compassion did not receive the grant from Chatham County.

We will be ordering both large-print Bibles that can be used for Bible Study groups, as well as regular print Bibles for the same use.

Our next meeting will be July 20th to be able to work around the July 4th weekend and other events happening.





BOARD OF PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

Property Management Updates

1. Sanctuary Painting.

All the inside perimeter Sanctuary walls have been primed and painted. Property Management members are usually on-site Monday and Friday from 9 am until noon painting. Barbara Duch was instrumental in the completion of painting in the Sanctuary and the Cry Room. We are now painting the Choir Room and will start on the hallways soon. Please contact Ed Rogers or Bob Hanovich if you are interested in priming and painting. Priming and painting, except for areas above 12 feet, will be completed in-house.

2. Tree Removal.

Three rotting trees were removed in early June. Their removal was recommended by three different arborists. The cost of the removal was \$2,500.

Ongoing Work or Requirements

The following work list has been developed per board responsibility Church Property and Equipment - Work Lists. The repairs and improvements are listed in priority order with the top priority listed first.

1. Mold.

Property management will continue to address visible areas of mold through cleaning, priming, and painting. Additionally, the Sanctuary and Narthex area Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) systems are being kept at cooler temperatures to engender an indoor relative humidity around 55% and never greater than 65%.

2. Carpet.

Our total carpeted area is around 8,000 square feet, therefore cleaning the Sanctuary and Narthex carpeting would cost between \$2,800 to \$4,000. Replacing the carpet would cost from \$40,000 to \$95,000; because the pews would have to be removed and reinstalled.

3. Education Building Drain Line.

McBride Plumbing recently removed a blockage in the Education Building drainpipe and then sent a camera the drain line and saw that the four-inch

diameter cast iron drainpipe was severely corroded and now had an inside diameter that was less than two inches. The original church building, built around 1970 and the 1978 addition, the gym area, share a common drain line. The Sanctuary-Social Hall building might also use the same drain line. The plumbers think we might get another two or three years before the pipe becomes narrowed to the point where it will not drain. We will get an estimate on replacing the cast iron with PVC. The drainpipe runs from the front corner, closest to the Meditation Garden, of the Education Building to a manhole located at the corner of Mercy and Woodley. The cost of drainpipe replacement is \$150 to \$250 linear foot, our run is around 150 feet, therefore, \$22,500 to \$37,500.

4. Other.

- a. Additional stucco replacement and repairs. Four panels, not previously repaired or replaced, require replacement.
- b. Building exterior paint to seal and protect the stucco surfaces from erosion and wear.
- c. Tree removal. Two arborists inspected all the trees on church property. One recommended the removal of fourteen trees. The other arborist recommended the removal of fifteen trees. Four of the trees are a hazard to either the main building or the education building. Two of the trees are a hazard to our neighborhood community.
- d. Conversion of large globe light fixtures in the Sanctuary to LED.
- e. Completion of interior work for removal of the large triangle window in the education building.
- f. Tree removal. Removal of remaining trees recommended for removal and the pruning of remaining trees per arborist recommendation.
- 5. The following actions have been started per broad responsibility Security and Protection of Church Assets Emergency and Security Equipment.

Cameras and Wi-Fi. Two additional 120-degree coverage cameras have been purchased and will be installed to monitor the back of the Sanctuary and Social Hall building. Two Blink cameras have been temporarily installed and show there is activity taking place. It is also recommended that three additional cameras be purchased to cover the garden area and the parking lot. This will enable the removal of the remaining older cameras, wires, and conduit mounted on the exterior of the buildings. Existing camera coverage will continue to be monitored to determine if additional cameras are required.

6. The following actions have been started per broad responsibility Church Property and Equipment - Implementation & Facilitation.

- a. Congregation members weekly complete lawn and garden care activities.
- b. There will be a church workday on the third Saturday of each month, from 9 am until noon. Lunch will be provided afterwards.
- 7. The following actions have been started per broad responsibility Miscellaneous General Responsibilities of The Board Help plan, implement, and conduct servant projects and encourage continued and increasing participation of congregational members in these activities.

BUILDING REPAIR FUND


For your convenience, we have two on-line giving applications available for your use.





Book Study with Trish Aamoth— This will be an in-depth discussion about **Warrier Menk** by LC-MS Author, Ray Keating. First in a series of books, the story revolves around a former CIA assassin, Stephen Grant, who has lived a far different, relatively quiet life as a parish pastor until an event challenges him to serve in a different way. Bible Tassel Craft with Linda Meseke— Join the fun in making a simple Bible tassel. In addition to the creative side of this session, we will talk about the increased meaning a tassel may bring to your Bible study.

Fun Facts about St. Simons Island:

- Originally inhabited by tribes of the Muscogee —later contested by the Spaniards, English & French
- · Produced rice and cotton for the Georgia Colony, worked by large numbers of enslaved Africans
- Has served as a location for many films including Roots (1977) and Anchorman 2 (2013)
- It is the largest of the Golden Isles (which also includes Sea Island, Jekyll Island and Little St Simons Island)
- Home of Christ Church, Frederica—John & Charles Wesley preached there before returning to England to help found the Methodist Church.
- St. Simons Lighthouse and Keepers Dwelling were built in 1872 to replace the original lighthouse destroyed by Confederate forces in 1861. The lighthouse is one of only five surviving towers in Georgia. It's beam casts out as far as 23 miles to sea.


